# Forest School at York Road Nursery School and Nursery

**Intention:** At York Road Nursery children are encouraged to be outdoors as much as possible regardless of the weather. Being in nature helps to keep children physically healthy, promotes well-being, boosts immunity and helps build resilience.

**Implementation:** Much evidence points to the benefits of being outdoors for children and adults alike. The Forest School ethos is to encourage children to be curious about the world around them, giving them time outdoors in a woodland environment to support and develop:

- their personal, social and emotional skills as they learn to work together as a team.
- their physical skills by running, climbing, etc.
- their practical skills such as den building;
- learn to take and manage risks.
- their independence, self-esteem and confidence as they learn these new skills.

**Inclusion:** Every child is unique and Forest School at York Road takes into account each child's capabilities, needs and interests alongside encourage a 'can do' attitude for all.
